Seabrook Station United Way Golf Invitational Crosses \$400,000 Threshold

RYE, NH - Seabrook Station held its annual Golf Invitational to benefit United Way of the Greater Seacoast (UWGS) on September 11, 2008 at Abeniqui Country Club in Rye, NH with outstanding results. Hitting the links were 136 golfers who raised a whopping \$30,000 for the UWGS -- the single largest annual amount of money in the 19 years the Station has been running the tournament. Thus far over the life of the tournament, more than \$400,000 dollars has been raised in support of the seacoast community.
